Background Image:

- 1. Open Photoshop
- 2. Go to File → Open → Choose photo file (I had previously saved the photo file I wanted to use to my desktop)

Duck:

- 1. File → Open → Chose the image you wish to use (I had previously saved the file I wanted to use to my desktop)
- 2. Zoom your photo in to 200%
- 3. Click on the magnetic lasso tool → Go around the entire outside of your photo. When finished double click.
- 4. Go to Edit \rightarrow Cut
- 5. Go back to your background image.
- 6. Create a new layer. Rename your layer "duck" by clicking on the word layer 1 and then changing it.
- 7. Go to Edit \rightarrow Paste
- 8. Now you can drag the photo around the screen and put it where you want it at.
- 9. My photo was too big for the background that I had chosen so I needed to resize my layer to make my image smaller. To do this I went to Edit → Free Transform → and then resized my duck image. I just clicked on the bottom corner and made my image smaller.

Merge the background and the duck onto one layer:

1. Click cntrl, shift, alt E to merge the two layers.

Dispersion Effect on Duck:

- 1. Click on layer and click ctrl J to duplicate the layer.
- 2. Click on the eye to hide the top layer.
- 3. Select the original layer.
- 4. Choose the lasso tool and select around the duck (Just a loose selection, does not need to be perfect at all).
- 5. When finished, right click and select fill.
- 6. Select ok. (This makes my duck disappear)
- 7. Click ctrl D to deselect.
- 8. Make your top layer visible again by clicking on the eye and select the top layer.
- 9. Select the quick selection tool and select the entire duck.
- 10. Select Refine Edge
- 11. Select the refine edge brush tool
- 12. Go around duck on the left side as needed
- 13. Select the Erase Refinements Tool to erase any areas that were accidently selected that you do not want.
- 14. Select Output to Layer Mask, select ok (This puts the duck on a separate background)
- 15. Duplicate the top layer by clicking ctrl j
- 16. Right click on the mask and apply layer mask.
- 17. Hide the middle layer (layer 1) by clicking the eye
- 18. I renamed the new layer, dispersion effect
- 19. Duplicate the dispersion effect layer by clicking ctrl j, I renamed the new layer duck
- 20. Select the dispersion effect layer
- 21. Go to Filter \rightarrow Liquify
- 22. Ensure the forward Warp Tool is selected

- 23. I warped the duck by pulling the left side of the image to the edge of the photo, click ok when finished
- 24. Hold alt when clicking on mask (ensure the mask is filled with black)
- 25. Select the duck layer and select the mask at the bottom
- 26. Make sure your foreground color is set to black, mine was set to white so I had to switch them.
- 27. Select the brush tool and choose a dispersion brush
- 28. Open up the brush panel
- 29. Start adding the effect
- 30. Once you are happy with the effect, select the dispersion effect layer, select the dispersion mask
- 31. Ensure your foreground color is set to white, I had to change this back.
- 32. Start adding the second layer of the dispersion effect. It is important to rotate your brush frequently
- 33. Select the duck mask layer, ensure your foreground layer is set to white.
- 34. Select a small brush with soft edges
- 35. Zoom in using your zoom tool
- 36. Start masking out unnecessary parts (clean up around the edges)
- 37. Create a new adjustment layer, select gradient map
- 38. Select the gradient editor
- 39. Choose a nice gradient, select ok and then change the opacity to something you like, I chose 10%
- 40. Now to sharpen the image, click cntrl, shift, alt E to to merge all visible layers.
- 41. I renamed this layer sharpen
- 42. Right click and select Convert Smart Object
- 43. Go to Filter → Sharpen → Unsharp Mask
- 44. I changed the filter to 60%

Jumping Person:

- 1. File → Open → Chose the image you wish to use (I had previously saved the file I wanted to use to my desktop)
- 2. Zoom your photo in to 200%
- 3. Click on the magnetic lasso tool → Go around the entire outside of your photo. When finished double click.
- 4. Go to Edit → Cut
- 5. Go back to your background image.
- 6. Create a new layer. Rename your layer "Jumping Person" by clicking on the word layer and then changing it.
- 7. Go to Edit \rightarrow Paste
- 8. Now you can drag the photo around the screen and put it where you want it at. My photo was too big for the background that I had chosen so I needed to resize my layer to make my image smaller. To do this I went to Edit → Free Transform → and then resized my jumping person image. I just clicked on the bottom corner and made my image smaller.
- 9. I used the eraser tool to go around my image and clean up any rough edges.

Adjust Hue/Saturation:

- 1. Go to Image → Adjustments → Hue/Saturation
- 2. I selected blues so I could just change the color of the dress

- 3. I then selected master so I could adjust the entire photo of the person jumping Adjust Curves:
 - 1. Go to Image → Adjustments → Curves
 - 2. I adjusted the curves to get more detail on the sky and in the tower in the center of the background.
